4	<p>The Flight of the Few - by Richard Hough. Paperback. Fiction. 1979.</p> <p>The summer of 1940. The Battle of Britain. For Flying Officer Keith Stewart and his American friends it meant pitting their slow, poorly-armed Hurricanes against the might of Messerschmitt 109's in the sky above England.</p>
5	<p>Angels 22 - Self Portrait of a Fighter Pilot. By George Barclay. Paperback. 1976.</p> <p>In the two years before he was shot down and killed over El Alamein, aged 22, Squadron Leader George Barclay D.F.C. had lived a lifetime of flying. One of only four officers in his squadron to survive the Battle of Britain, he was later shot down over occupied France.</p>
6	<p>Hamlyn Guide to Weather Forecasting.</p> <p>A practical guide to the weather. How to make your own forecasts. Numerous colour photographs and diagrams of cloud formations, storms etc.</p>
7	<p>Ginger Lacey - Fighter Pilot.</p> <p>Fast moving true story of one pilot's war. Battle of Britain "top scorer". Pilot of first Spitfire over Japan. The man who shot down the Heinkel that bombed Buckingham Palace.</p>
8	<p>Air Bridge - by Hammond Innes. Fiction. 253 pages.</p>
9	<p>Tumult in the Clouds - Lt-Col James Goodson.</p> <p>Officially credited with 32 enemy aircraft destroyed, Lt-Col Goodson, a former American fighter pilot, ranks as one of the leading flying aces of WWII.</p>

- 11** Glide Path - by Arthur C. Clarke. Fiction. 234 pages.
Set during WWII in the pioneering days of radar, presents the unusual picture of a world famous science fiction writer turning for once to the past.
- 14** Enemy Coast Ahead - by Guy Gibson V.C.

- 35** Bomber - by Len Deighton.

Written from personal recollections, Lancaster Target combines the tension of war-fare with the light-hearted and often hilarious ways in which Currie and his crew found relief.
- 45** The First Transatlantic Flight, 1919. - Hy Steirman & Glenn D. Kittler.
The incredible adventure of the NC-4, the U.S. Navy plane that made history.

The story of Wing-Commander R.R. Standord Tuck, D.S.O., D.F.C. & two bars.
- 50** Silver Wings, Santiago Blue - by Janet Dailey.
The story of the first WASP's, the Women Airforce Service Pilots, who risked their lives and suffered the censure of their peers to help the war effort during WWII.
- 51** Goodbye Mickey Mouse - by Len Deighton.
December 1943 and, on a rain-swept American airbase in East Anglia a group of young fighter pilots wait for the orders that will dispatch them in their newly-issued Mustangs into the winter skies.
